

There is a small charge for entry of £2 per person and for this you get excellent service at the bar from the friendliest of bar staff and hours of listening (and playing!) to all sorts of music from folk through soul to rock, all performed by amateur and very talented musicians.

The awards trophies were duly presented to the winners, eighteen in all, with Steve biting his nails as he was the last to be announced: a fine ploy by the organisers as they were then able to get Steve to close the event with a brilliant rendition of 'Summertime' followed by a jaunty blues number. 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From the Parish Council

County Council

Stagecoach has been approached to see if they can lessen the impact on the Cambridge and St Ives evening bus services following the subsidy cuts. They say that there is nothing they can do as without the subsidy the routes are not economic.

Work has commenced cutting down the trees along the river bank to the north of Willingham. This is preparatory work for major strengthening of the embankment to prevent further subsidence.

A Coordinator is still needed for the Community Car Scheme. Please will anyone who feels that they could offer some voluntary time for this worthy cause contact the parish office or Shona Johnstone.

More news from Councillor Johnstone is contained in her jottings on page X.

District Council

It has been confirmed that SCDC will have to take on some £200 million of debt to share the burden on past council housing expenditure incurred nationwide. Those councils that have run up very large debts will gain, whilst those like SCDC who are debt free at the moment will lose. It appears that prudence is being punished and there is no guarantee that there is not more pain to come.

It is not entirely clear what the final outcome will be on Gypsy and Traveller directives. For the time being there seems little point in identifying further sites that may not be needed. The case for proportionality has been recognised in a recent decision.

On Northstowe things do seem to be happening. A new formal agreement has been signed and a master plan is due in September. Work has begun on demolishing some of the buildings. It is likely that the new town will proceed albeit at a slower pace.

Central government's Localism Bill is still very much under discussion. If passed in its present form it will have a big impact on Parish Councils.

Parish Council

Resignations have been received from Councillors Borland and Tsmondo due to other work commitments. The Parish Council is most grateful for the service they have given. Any person interested in community affairs and in helping to maintain a good community to live in by becoming a Councillor should contact the parish office.

With kerb side collections now well established the can banks and glass banks behind the Co-op are being removed. A clothes bank, small paper bank and new media bank for books, CDs, DVDs, cassettes and video tapes will remain by kind permission of the store.

Help for heroes

A national problem has been identified with some ex service personnel finding it hard to adjust to civilian life. Volunteers across the country are trying to help and Chris Ginn, the president of Over Royal British Legion has agreed to be the 'Heroes Contact' for Willingham, Swavesey and Over. It means that when a person is discharged from service their unit will put them in touch with the local Heroes Contact and encourage them to join their local RBL Branch who will be able to offer a sympathetic ear and advice on where to go for more help and support.

It's all about us!



Shakespearaphobia

Rehearsals for WSC's summer production of *As You Like It* get underway this month but the cast have not been sitting idle for the last few weeks. Instead, they have been getting to grips with the play through a number of workshops.

Two things are likely to strike fear into the heart of any actor at the prospect of taking part in a Shakespeare play. Firstly: the concept of trying to understand what on earth he is talking about; at first sight some of the language seems unrecognisable, almost foreign. And secondly: speaking the verse. It is almost as if Shakespeare has deliberately written reams of unpronounceable tongue twisters.

Both these issues were explored at WSC's workshops. The cast went through scenes together, unpicking the meanings of phrases and speeches and putting together the stories of the characters.

It turns out that *As You Like It* is a very timely play full of very modern themes: people's desire to escape the stresses of a busy working world; men's and women's assumptions about the other gender; sibling rivalry and the fundamental quest for the meaning of life... Stay tuned...

Pastoral Letter

The Waiting Game

We've all played it. From the child that has only recently learned to talk to the oldest member of the family. The waiting game - no sooner have we set out on the journey when the cry rings out, 'Are we nearly there yet?' Waiting for an appointment, an interview and the outcome, exam results, Christmas, birthday treats or the sale of the house. It's all the same - we have to wait and we don't want to. We become impatient. Or, how about when we are waiting for someone to turn up for a date, relatives arriving, husband or wife getting ready to go out, meeting some friend in town? Waiting is never easy. I have an aversion to queuing! There will always be a better time to make the purchase when there is no queue and I won't have to wait. I will admit that I am impatient. And why is the bus always late when you are waiting? And why is it that the traffic light that is nearly always green happens to be red the day you are in a hurry, and there is a tractor up ahead!

Easter has gone. Christians all around the world have celebrated the coming back to life of Jesus Christ, God in the flesh, after a brutal death that was meant to be the end of him. Now that he has risen he meets the disciples and tells them to wait in Jerusalem, (Acts chapter 1 verse 4). He promises that a gift will be given to them. A

strange gift promised by His Father, the gift of the Holy Spirit. I wonder if the disciples had any idea what Jesus was talking about. In the three years that they had spent with him they had seen him do some amazing things. He had even told them that they would do even greater things. My guess is that found that hard to believe. 

Library News

Library Review Public Meeting on 12 April

Mike Hosking, Service Director for Libraries, Learning and Culture, and Chris Eaton from the Library Service at Cambridgeshire County Council presented results of the recent library review aimed at saving money. They told a packed school hall that following an assessment based on community criteria and performance, Willingham was one of 13 libraries where the community would be asked to pay for staff and running costs, and explore sharing the building with other services, or face closure. Residents questioned the results of the assessment, which did not tally with local experience, and asked exactly what this contribution would entail. There was some anger as they also spoke about how much they valued the current Library and its staff; it was an excellent facility, particularly well used by children. There will now be a further period of consultation, seeking ideas for raising the required contribution and looking again at the assessment. If you wish to be involved, please visit the library to put your name forward: community support is vital to keep our library.

Digging for bones and prehistoric forests

Discovering the environmental history of Willingham Mere

You've watched the TV programmes, now you can put on a brightly coloured jacket, pick up a trowel, and unearth a bit of local history at Willingham Mere.

Archaeologists from Cambridge Archaeological Unit of the University of Cambridge have been excavating sites ahead of Hanson's Needingworth Quarry workings. The archaeologists have previously discovered Bronze Age and Iron Age archaeology and evidence of the hunting of beaver and rare wetland birds such as Dalmatian pelican at Ouse Fen. These species once thrived in a huge natural wetland that existed before drainage — including Willingham Mere, a now disappeared lake. This spring, they are offering a limited number of places for local people to join an excavation at Willingham Mere, between Monday 30 May and Friday 10 June.

Preference will be given to people who are available to help for at least three days of either week, or both days of the middle weekend. We'd also like to hear from people who could offer less time. To register your interest and book your free place(s), please phone 01954 233260.

You will be provided with hard hats, high-visibility jackets and tools but will need to bring sturdy boots. You will be working from 10 am to 4 pm daily, with a lunch break. Participants will need to be reasonably fit, as some of the digging is likely to be heavy. However, if you don't fancy digging there will also be opportunities to work on some of the finds – we are expecting preserved prehistoric plant remains, trees and other evidence of the lost wetland to be found. Please state your preference at time of booking.

Regrettably, young children are not able to participate in the fieldwork but are welcome with parents on site tours. Access is not suitable for baby buggies or wheel chairs.

The results of previous archaeological and environmental work will also be displayed at the site, which is between Willingham and Earith, throughout the period, from 10 30 am to 4 00 pm daily. Limited parking is available nearby in the lay by on B1050 Shelford's Road.


Pedestrians and cyclists can arrive from Willingham via the network of public bridleways. The dig site is at TL402735, adjacent to a bridleway on Weathersome Common.

If you're not able to get involved with the digging, you are welcome to come for a free tour. Short guided tours with an archaeologist will run daily, starting at 11 am and 2 pm. Longer guided tours, will take place on the Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons, immediately after the archaeology tours.

These guided walks will also look at the wildlife that is now recolonising Ouse Fen, which is being recreated by the Hanson-RSPB Wetland Project. The evidence from previous archaeology informs the restoration plans after sand and gravel have been extracted. Many wetland birds are already appreciating the rapidly-developing reedbeds and new meres.

This work is funded by a Knowledge Transfer grant from the University of Cambridge and with the support of Hanson, RSPB and A G Wright & Son (Farms) Ltd.



JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

I have just returned from the meeting held to discuss the future of Willingham Library and I would like to thank the editorial team at *Willingham News* for agreeing to extend their deadline to enable me to report on the meeting.

Around 150 residents of Willingham, Over and Longstanton were packed into the hall and the officers told me afterwards that it was one of the best attended meetings they have held so far. The meeting started with a presentation by the Library Service, giving the background to the current position. The County Council has to make budget reductions of £160m over the next five years and the share by the library service is some £3.2m, or 48% of the library budget. Given that staff costs account for 60% of the library budget, then cuts in staffing will be inevitable.

It is intended that the County's libraries will be run by an independent charitable Trust from April 2012. There are a number of financial advantages to this; first a considerable reduction in the business rates paid by the libraries and second, the Trust will be able to apply for grant funding not available to the County Council. It is also hoped that the Trust will be able to respond more flexibly to changes in individual library circumstances than the County Council is currently able to do.

Self service facilities will be extended to all libraries and the work processes will be streamlined, although there was no explanation of what this will actually entail. The County Council is looking to the local community to provide either funding to pay for staff costs, or volunteers to help run the library.

There were inevitably many questions from the audience, including some concern about how the self service system would operate, and the importance of library staff being on hand for visitors to talk to. The value of the library to the community, particularly the elderly and

children, was also raised by many people and it was confirmed that 51% of books borrowed were children's books.

Willingham Library has been identified as one of seven libraries who are considered to be performing less well and with less community need than some of the county's other libraries. The community figures were challenged by a number of people. I was able to say that I have already met the library service twice to go through the figures because they do not reflect the Willingham that I know. I am not convinced that the population will fall, given the recent building in Willingham; I am also concerned that the large traveller population is not reflected in the figures. The officers have agreed to look at these figures again.

The next stage is for a follow up meeting, hopefully with the Friends of Willingham Library and Willingham Parish Council. I also hope that some members of the seven reading groups supported by the Library might want to become more involved, including some representatives from Over.

While the future does still remain uncertain, I am encouraged by the turnout at tonight's meeting and also by the comment of the head of the library service to me this morning, 'Our aim is to keep all the libraries open, by hook or by crook'. With goodwill and support from the local community I believe that the future for Willingham is positive.

WAG Environmental Group

An Environmental Group has now been formed by WAG with the following intended scope of activity and areas of interest: To initiate and manage projects, which enhance the appearance and environment of Willingham, and to contribute to the stewardship and amenity value of the green areas including trees, working with the relevant councils and authorities as appropriate.

The activity areas will include: **Green areas** – trees, preservation orders and planning issues – identify potential tree/bulb planting sites, nature reserve/wood, community orchard – set up volunteer group, ie assisting WPC with cemetery maintenance/planting bulbs. **Litter, cleanliness, fly tipping and recycling** – periodic targeted litter picks/clean ups and awareness campaigns - recycling and collection/disposal initiatives. **Footpaths and cycle-ways for leisure** – maintenance, campaigning for improvement and information **Set up smaller task groups** – utilising apples and other excess fruit and vegetables, seasonal markets.

The following areas are identified in the initial stage of

the project: - Clearing and planting of trees/shrubs along the perimeter around the play area beyond the Ploughman Hall to improve the amenity value of the area — Targeted litter pick days and tackling specific problem areas — Making a local Rights of Way map available plus suggested walks — Creation of a Community Orchard/Nature Area by restoring an abandoned orchard — Local produce sales in season, bring and buy on a Saturday morning — Ivy clearance in the rear cemetery area as a volunteer task on behalf of WPC.

These are suggestions from the initial Environmental Group meeting, but what do you want to see happen, what would be your priorities and are you willing to get involved? The WAG Environmental Group can do the background work but project planning and execution will require the help of volunteers and a larger core group. If you think these ideas are of value and you want them to happen then we need to hear from you!
