
Willingham Primary School.

Old Willingham



This month's photo shows people in their Sunday best outside a rather dilapidated cottage. One woman is holding a baby in a fine white dress and the boy next to her has a wide brimmed hat. On the right, a group of children are sitting on the ground playing. It's a happy scene. But while the cottage looks pretty to us, the reality was that such old buildings were often damp, dark and crowded inside. There would be no electricity, and water would have to be carried from the village pump on the Green. The location of this building is given away by the brick pillar with the carved stone on top. These pillars were outside the old Baptist Tabernacle on George Street - and some of them are still there outside the new church building. This clue tells us that the cottage was by the lane next to the Tabernacle where George Street descends to the fen. The picture is probably taken around 1900.

We passed through cathedral sized caverns where slate had been mined and guides demonstrated how the 2 tonne blocks were split into roofing slates by hand.

On Saturday evening there was a dinner with music and dancing to a live band. The Mayor hosted a reception at the Town Hall on Sunday morning to officially mark the 15th anniversary, with a local choir providing the entertainment. An afternoon walk in the countryside allowed all of us to enjoy the spring sunshine, before returning with our friends for dinner.

LOOKING BACK

The recent *Willingham News* reports that the crime figures are down. Looking Back we are unsure what earlier figures would have shown but old newspapers have reported unusual crimes associated with Willingham people.

The newspaper of Monday 15 May 1900 told that Harriet Few of Willingham had been fined 5s for driving a cart without a light at Longstanton. Defendant: 'I shall not pay; I'll go to gaol. I think it is rather hard for a woman to go to work all the week and be stopped by a policeman simply because she had no light attached to her cart. I am not willing to pay this money. I do not consider that I was doing wrong, and I will go to gaol. How long will it be?'

On the 29 April 1910, the paper had a story about a Willingham labourer who was charged with stealing £40 in gold from his mother. His parents had gone to work leaving him alone in the house and the money under the mattress. The neighbour saw the lad with a handful of gold and a search of the house revealed the money had gone. Police discovered he had been showing a lot of gold in a public house at Longstanton before leaving for Cambridge by train. When arrested at the Compasses lodging house in East Road he said 'They should not leave the money lying about in the house; I told her. She always scrapped the last penny out of me and is always cadging money of me'

On the 13 May 1910, there was an article on the great excitement in Willingham on Sunday at the report that the Rectory had been broken into and a large crowd collected outside the gates. It appears that a rough-looking man of the tramp class had made his way there as soon as the rector and household had gone to church, one maid only being left in charge of the house. When she discovered that food was missing from the larder, Police Constable Breed was promptly informed. He found a man in a shed in a grass field in Long Lane.

The press also reported on Thursday 17 April 1928 that two Willingham men were convicted at Cambridgeshire magistrates court of stealing potatoes from their employer, farmer Thomas Langan, and each fined 10s.

Roads - current and proposed

Readers of *Willingham News* will recall that Cambridgeshire County Council planned to replace several short sections of the B1050 over the summer. Each would use a different method, so that a decision could be made on the best solution. They have now decided not to do this, but to continue with piecemeal repairs as necessary. The recent closure and 'repair' of the B1050 has, if anything, left the road in a worse condition. The Parish Council has contacted the County Council about the latest patching and has been told that they are looking into the situation.

The government's intention to update the A14 has been well publicised – even making the national news. It is proposed that the trunk road from Swavesey to Ellington be replaced with a toll road, with an alternative non-tolled route running more or less along the line of the existing A14. The stretch from Swavesey to Bar Hill would be widened to 3 lanes each way and the Bar Hill to Girton stretch widened to 4 lanes each way. The viaduct at Huntingdon would only be partly removed hence still allowing local access to Huntingdon.

The Parish Council are concerned about the implications for local roads such as the B1050 and have asked that a proper analysis of the possible impact is carried out. We are particularly worried about traffic which might be avoiding the tolls.

Better Bus Facilities

Cambridgeshire County Council has invited Parish Councils to bid for grants towards improving village bus facilities. We will be expressing an interest in new bus shelters and real time displays, and will let you know of any progress.

Ploughman Hall Car Park

The car park is usually secured by locking the gate, but this means it can only be used by keyholders and has led to problems locking up if stray cars have then entered the car park. We will shortly be installing an overhead height barrier at the entrance, which means the car park can then be left unlocked. This will provide additional space for users of the recreation ground and sports pavilion, as well as being more convenient for the Ploughman Hall.

Pastoral Letter

'IN MY FATHER'S HOUSE, THERE ARE MANY ROOMS.' [John 14:2]

On the last weekend of October clocks went back one hour. Now we can expect fallen leaves, fog and wet weather with little else ahead but a gloomy winter. As the days shorten and the beautiful autumn colours begin to fade, we see more clearly the splendour and frailty of human life.

November begins with All Saints' Day. We celebrate the feast day of all those who have died and are now with the Lord. All Saints' Day brings to mind the everyday people down through the ages who were friends of God. It brings to mind our departed grandparents, parents, relatives and friends. Not many of them held important positions in life. They are not canonised saints, that is to say, they are not enrolled in the official list of saints. Like ourselves they experienced the trials of growing up, the tensions of living with others and all the normal problems and uncertainties of life. All Saints' Day gives us a glimpse into our own glorious future, our eternal destiny which has to be worked out in love and service here on earth. 'The Saints have no need of honour from us; neither does our devotion add the slightest thing to what is theirs.... But I tell you, when I think of them, I feel myself inflamed by a tremendous yearning'. (St Bernard)

The saints have no need for our help. They are in heaven and they are happy. To be in heaven means to be completely united with God. The problem is that we do not know for sure if someone is in heaven or not, unless a person is officially declared a "saint" by the Church. This process usually takes quite a long time and

In November we have Remembrance Sunday. On that day we remember and pray for all those who died during the Two World Wars and other military conflicts of the 20th and 21st centuries. Twenty years ago when I first came to England that was the day, after which Christmas decorations started to appear in shops. I thought it was one of signs of respect for those who sacrificed their lives so that we could live in peace and freedom. This is no longer a case, but still there are other ways of showing our gratitude and respect.

As we honour and pray for all those who went to the Lord before us, we remember that we follow the same direction. Our final destination is the eternal life in the Kingdom of our Heavenly Father.

'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms...' (John14:1-2).
