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

This is a very early photo of what is, today, the Green. The date of the photo is probably about 1900 and before the arrival of gas to the village. When gas arrived in 1920s the cottages were demolished and a new gas showroom was built. Obviously, the Gas Company was not going to sell much gas if no-one had any gas appliances! Today the gas showroom has become the Library. The Vine Inn on the right was the largest Inn and the most up-market place to stay for visitors. The village pond, in the foreground, was really just a big puddle that came and went according to the weather. Evidently this had been a dry period as there is no sign of any water!

Steve Foreman Has Retired

Steve Foreman has hung up his overalls and Foreman's Garage is now under new ownership.

Steve opened the garage in February 1985 and for 39 years, apart from annual leave and less than a fortnight off through sickness, has been there to carry out repairs and service the cars of many village residents, who will be very sorry not to see him in his oily overalls. His very large customer base was because Steve was always considered to be reliable, honest and trustworthy. He has



never needed to advertise for custom as his reputation has spread by word of mouth and, apart from regular loyal

village customers, he had customers from Bar Hill, St Ives and Cambridge. He even had one customer from France who, whenever he came to visit family, would arrange for Steve to carry any work on his car.

Steve has always been a mechanic. He left school with good grades in practical subjects and got an apprenticeship with Cambridge buses. In fact, he was offered ten apprenticeships but settled with the bus company and achieved the highest grades in his year group. From there he became self-employed in Cambridge with a partner for about two years. He used his share from this job as the deposit for the garage.

In those early days the garage sold ice creams, sweets and cigarettes and was also a video shop in addition to selling petrol and carrying out car repairs. A

friend, Jean Carrier, helped out in the shop. Steve's wife, Sue, has always been heavily involved in the running of the business and with her brother, Peter, worked alongside Steve for many years. For the past few years though it has just been Steve and Sue, who met when they were both pupils at Impington Village College and have been together ever since.

More recently most of the work has been day-to-day repairs, services and pre-MOT work and there has been no shortage of it! They stopped doing bodywork repairs 20 years ago and petrol sales about ten years later.

During his working life at the garage, Steve once got a piece of metal in his eye when welding and on another occasion sustained a bad injury to his finger. Apart from that it has been the normal aches, pains and bad knees

which are part and parcel of a very physical job.

Although Steve has hung up his garage overalls, he will continue to be very active. He admits he has always found it very difficult to sit still! His hobbies include surfing, sailing, fishing, gardening, woodworking (I have seen some of the things he has crafted from wood, and they would look good at any craft fair), hill walking and campervanning. During his retirement he is looking forward to doing more of all these activities. Steve is one of four brothers, one of whom is his identical twin. It is obvious that he is very family orientated. Recently the Foremans' clan, all of whom, including grandchildren, are very active and share similar interests, went away together.

There were 47 of them, including Steve's Dad, who is an active 90 year old!



I am sure we all wish Steve and wife Sue a very happy and well-deserved retirement. They will be missed at the garage.

Please note the surgery will be CLOSED for the bank holidays on Monday 6 May and Monday 27 May.

Please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last for the long weekends, remembering to order your repeats at least three working days before collection. When the surgery is closed, please call **111** for medical assistance, or **999** for a life-threatening emergency. For Urgent Mental Health Support, please call **111 and select option 2**.

Details of local pharmacies that will be open over the bank holidays will be posted on the surgery doors, and also on social media and our website.

Cancelling Appointments

We understand that sometimes plans change and you may find you are unable to attend the surgery for a pre-booked appointment. We respectfully ask that you contact the surgery by telephone to let us know if you can no longer make it. You will not have to hold for any period of time, just press **option 3** which will allow you to leave a message to let us know. Please do not cancel appointments last minute via email as, when we are very busy, we are unable to monitor the email inbox.

Pharmacy First Scheme

Patients can now get treatment for seven common conditions directly from their local pharmacy, without the need for a GP appointment or prescription. These conditions are –

- Sinusitis
 Sore throat
- Earache
 Infected insect bite
- Impetigo (a bacterial skin infection) Shingles
- Uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women

Pharmacy First will enable community pharmacists to supply prescription-only medicines, including antibiotics and antivirals, where clinically appropriate. You can get treatment for these conditions by walking into the pharmacy or contacting them virtually. The pharmacist will be able to speak to you privately in a separate consultation room and they may perform an examination or ask to access your medical records. The pharmacist will be able to recommend the best course of action on an individual patient basis, including by issuing prescriptions for antibiotics or antivirals where necessary. By reducing the number of patients with common conditions, needing blood pressure checks or oral contraception visiting a GP, Pharmacy First aims to free up 10 million GP appointments a year by next winter for more complex diagnosis. This will give GPs time and space to see patients with more complex conditions and we thank you for your support by using this new initiative.

One hundred years ago, the land that would become Fen Drayton Lakes was a series of floodplain meadows in the river valley of the Great Ouse. This began to change when low-scale sand and gravel extraction started to take place during the war years of the 1940s for local military and agricultural use. Commercial extraction began in the 1950s and for the next 40-odd years the site became a large, active quarry exporting material for construction around the region.

Nowadays, Fen Drayton Lakes is an RSPB nature reserve made up of a variety of habitats comprising open water, reedbed and wetland mixed with grassland, scrub, and woodland. A huge variety of wildlife is drawn to the area with over 1,900 different species recorded on site to date, including 230 species of bird, 26 species of butterfly and almost 500 species of flowering plant.

As we head into the summer months, wildlife is all around, making it a fantastic time to visit. You're never far from water and wildlife here; it surrounds you wherever you wander. Explore the woods and catch glimpses of secluded bays and pools. You won't be able to miss majestic Mute Swans on the lakes, but you'll need to look a little harder to see the many colourful insects. The riverside meadows are alive with nature – reeds rustling, birds warbling, grasshoppers chirping and bees buzzing.

Events at Fen Drayton Lakes

- Wild(ish) Camping for Groups a unique opportunity for groups to camp on site.
- Wednesday Wander Guided Walk join our knowledgeable volunteers for a walk around the reserve.
- **Dusk Guided Walk** an evening guided walk to discover the birds, mammals and insects which are more active later in the day up until dusk.
- Willow Weaving Workshop using willow harvested from the reserve, try your hand at making a woven garden obelisk using traditional methods.
- **Guided Canoe Trail** slink through the reeds on our new water-based trail to discover one of the harder to view lakes from a new perspective.

Events at Ouse Fen

- Booming Bittern Guided Walk An evening guided walk around the newest reedbeds where Bitterns are making their homes.
- **Reedbed Ramble** A guided walk around the newest part of the reserve to look at all the wildlife that is starting to colonise the site.

But it could have been so different — the game was invented initially as a Victorian parlour game for the rich, reportedly played on a dining table with cigar box tops and rounded champagne corks. Early names for the game were Gossima, Whiff-Whaff, Pom-Pom, Clip-Clap and others. Willingham Whiff-Whaff Club just doesn't have the same ring to it! Rubber or cork balls, both with unpredictable bounces, were the standard until about 1900, when celluloid balls were first used. Nature's Names

Magpies – we often see them around the village and hear them chattering. Just as jackdaws used to be called *daws* before the pet name *Jack* was added, magpies used to be called *pies* until *Mag* was added.

The *pie* part of the name came from the Latin *pica*, and originally from the Indo-European word *pi*, meaning *pointedness*, possibly referring to the beak or the long tail. *Pie* was first used in English in the 1200s; *mag* was added in the 1500s, being one of the pet forms of *Margaret*. It wasn't until the 17th century that magpie became the common form. But why *Margaret*? This is where I distance myself from the reason — it was because Margarets were mercilessly symbolized as gossipers and chatterers. As was the bird.

Moving on... Magpies / pies were often used in literature. In the Shakespeare play, Henry VI says 'and chatt'ring pies in dismal discords sung...' — the Bard of Avon used corvids a lot in his plays, usually to symbolize bad omens or witchcraft. They were thought to be possessed by the Devil himself!

Magpie superstitions are numerous. Many of us will know the 18th century nursery rhyme: 'One for sorrow, Two for joy, Three for a girl, Four for a boy, Five for silver, Six for gold, Seven for secrets to never be told.'

It's tempting to add an eighth for our village: '*Eight for potholes to be filled*'.

As for magpies being thieves who will steal any shiny or not-so-shiny object, this isn't so. Numerous university researchers with far too much time on their hands have debunked the myth, and proved that magpies, while they will happily raid songbirds' nests, are no more likely to carry out such heists than any other bird.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting is on **15 May** at 7 30 pm in the Octagon. Residents are invited to attend and get information on the activities in the village. Anglian Water are coming to present as will other local groups supported by the Parish Council, who will present reports and/or accounts. The County, District, and Parish Councils will also report to the public.

Speed Cushions (Bumps)

Following last year's survey of residents in Rampton Road which voted two to one in favour of speed bumps, the Parish Council recommended to County Highways to proceed with the scheme. When the details were published, comments resulted in a vote against it. The Parish Council conducted a further survey of all the residences along Rampton Road with more details of the effects around the decision. This resulted in a narrow (26-25) vote against these traffic calming measures. This was discussed at the April Parish Council meeting and the recommendation to Highways is not to proceed with them. The likely result of this is that the 20mph zone will start just south of Newington.

SpeedWatch

The village has a very active SpeedWatch group which operates mainly along Earith Road and Station Road (the B1050). To run more of these sessions including elsewhere in the village they are needing new volunteers. This normally involves an hour or so once or twice a month. Flooding

The council are continuing (with the help of some local experts) to liaise with Anglian Water and County Council to try and bring some resolution to the issues faced by the village.

Dogs

We have had complaints regarding increased dog waste both in and out of bags being left on Black Pit Drove and the Droveway, off Haden Way, as well as elsewhere in the village. Please clear up after your dogs and use the bins around the village. Also please note that dogs are not allowed on the Recreation Field nor the QEII Play Field, but are on the Community Orchard, Barton Field, and the site on Meadow Road.

Earith Road and the Orchard

Can we remind residents to use the footpath provided to the Orchard and not the private roadway across the front of the bungalows.

Car Parking

Car parking around the school is an ongoing issue. Can we remind residents they cannot park on the single or double yellow lines, and even those with Blue Badges must not park dangerously nor near junctions. The civil parking enforcement programme is now active, and the village will have visits from the Council who will issue parking tickets to offenders.

We still have one vacancy and would encourage anyone who might be interested to contact us for an informal chat/more information. This is not an onerous position and gives residents the opportunity to influence and help others in the village.

District Councillor (SCDC) Bill Handley's Report

Weekly Food Waste Collections

Weekly food waste collections are to become a reality for us all by 31 March 2026. Government funding is being made available to cover new food waste containers and specialist collection vehicles; I will give more details as soon as they are available.

Council Agrees Funding to Protect Cash Machines

SCDC has allocated up to £100,000 to better protect the District's cash machines from ram-raids, using funding from the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund. Heavy-duty planters are to be installed in front of some cash machines to prevent or slow down the activity of the thieves. Not all locations will be suitable for the planters due to a lack of available space around them. The police are advising on priorities and the Co-op store in Cambourne will be the first to have the planters; we will monitor the success of the installation.

Statement of Community Involvement for Planning

SCDC, together with Cambridge City Council has formally adopted a new key planning document which sets out how they will help residents have their say on a wide range of planning matters during the next five years. The Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) is intended to increase public participation in the planning system, empowering residents to play an active role in shaping the future of Greater Cambridge. District Councillor (SCDC) Dan Lentell's Report

On 27 March, South Cambridgeshire District Council met to deal with the single item - South Cambridgeshire Investment Partnership Investment at Cambourne - in a separate extraordinary meeting rather than as part of the already lengthy annual budget session previously reported to you.

Much of the meeting was held in closed session with the press and public excluded. The Council failed to anticipate a conflict of interest and continued with the meeting, with the result that there was not full compliance with the rules in so doing.

The Council's finance officer declared that he is a director of a company that stands to benefit from resolutions placed before us, even though he is only a director of the company as a result of his professional role at the Council. That does indicate a conflict of interest. I make no allegations of actual wrongdoing, however, along with others, I am simply pointing out that the rules which ensure transparency were ignored.

'Being a director of a local authority-controlled company requires officers and elected members appointed to those roles to operate in a completely different legal and philosophical framework to that they are used to inside their local authority ... Too often, this is not understood until problems arise, resulting in reputational and financial damage and in some cases, external intervention directly impacting on your authority.' – *Local Authority Company Review Guidance* 2023


The problem here arose because ONLY the relevant officer was in a position to explain the business on the agenda paper. The meeting could not go ahead if he had to leave the room. In a well-run and well-ordered Council, this conflict would have been anticipated and another officer would have been thoroughly briefed in order to allow regular proceedings to continue. That did not happen. This is precisely the kind of situation warned of in the guidance which discourages Councils from appointing senior officers to such roles.

I have been concerned for some time that South Cambridgeshire's handling of the CEO's undeclared conflict of interest – for example on the topic of the Four Day Week – has been self-defeating. Here is another example – entirely unrelated and entirely avoidable – in which the actions taken by the Council do not follow the letter or the spirit of the rules.

If matters are not always being dealt with at the highest level, with the highest levels of scrutiny and oversight – something the independent apolitical local government peer review of South Cambs says is not the case – then what confidence can other stakeholders have?

County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

I hope this update finds you well. The following is based upon my report to the Parish Councils in my division.

Development Corporation to Decide the Future of Cambridge

The Government has set out more details of its plans for a huge expansion of Cambridge and the areas around it (with 150,000 more houses) in a document called *The Case for Cambridge*. A new Development Corporation called the Cambridge Delivery Group is to deliver the Government's vision for Cambridge. They will be a new and unaccountable body deciding the future of the city; some locally elected representatives will be on an advisory board, but it appears that decisions will be taken elsewhere.

Household Support Fund and Supermarket Vouchers

The Government's budget included an announcement that it would be extending the Household Support Fund for six months, but did not announce this in time for local Councils to include it in their budgets. So, the Council's Strategy Resources & Performance Committee has agreed to modify its spending plans. The supermarket vouchers will therefore continue to be issued for the next six months.

Cost of Living

The Council's Communities Social Mobility & Inclusion Committee (COSMIC) has approved an additional £150,000 to Cambridge Housing Society to deliver the Cambridgeshire Local Assistance Scheme, which supports Cambridgeshire residents facing unexpected financial difficulties. Anglian Water

We have been urging Anglian Water to engage with residents regarding surface water and foul water drainage in Cottenham and Willingham. We are pleased that they will attend the Annual Parish Meetings, make a presentation and be ready to answer questions from residents.

Highways

I am pleased that the line markings along the High Street have been completed thereby hopefully improving access to their drives for residents.

Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE)

A number of visits by CPE officers have taken place in Willingham since its introduction. It has been requested that future visits are timed to coincide with school start/ finish.

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
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
